Anybody out there concerned at all about a series of bold and unprovoked attacks on law enforcement officers (and a K-9, too)? A West Palm Beach officer gets shot in the shoulder in a clearly marked police car, a uniformed PBSO lieutenant takes a bullet and so does the K-9 out in front of him, another guy goes running and gunning down the street with deputies after two carjackings and shooting up at a PBSO helicopter, and video captures a guy shooting at Boynton Beach officers and wounding one, and our members' conduct is in the cross-hairs? A PBSO sergeant gets jumped in a dark parking lot after identifying himself as a deputy sheriff, and another guy tries pulling a gun on a deputy trying to sort out alcohol-fueled fights spread across another dark parking lot, and our members are the ones getting challenged?

Their claims are reckless with the facts and recklessly ramping up more recklessness. While some lawyers looking to profit from the tragedies is nothing new, a wannabe sheriff doing it is an all-time low.

Reluctant though we are to go negative unless that line is crossed against us, it's been crossed by a guy running for Sheriff in Palm Beach County, and running his mouth at meetings about how these shootings wouldn't have happened on his watch. Trust me when I tell you: I know how hard it is for a family to cope with the loss of a loved one. But, trying to advance a political career on tragedy, as Joe Talley is trying to do, really is despicable. He's made it clear that, as Sheriff, he won't wait for the facts to decide who's at fault in his deputies' deadly encounters. Officers of the Month - March 2012


West Palm Beach Officers Rade Momirovich and Covelle Padgett

Officer Momirovich returned fire. The suspect began to chase Officer Momirovich. Officer Covelle Padgett shot the suspect to prevent him from shooting Officer Momirovich.

Officer Momirovich reloaded and shot the suspect several more times. The suspect was deceased at the scene. Because of the good and courageous police work of these officers, likely many other lives were saved.

<u>Ten Thirty Three</u>

"Unlawful Binding Interest Arbitration" and Other Florida Profundities: Actually, it's worse than you thought.

n a series of cases culminating in April 20, 2012 Final Orders by our Public Employees Relations Commission ("PERC") the Miami Association of Fire Fighters challenged the City of Miami's declaration of "financial urgency;" by which the City sought to modify a collective bargaining agreement in effect between the IAFF and the City of Miami. There were two (2) separate cases in consequence of the parties' unfair labor practice charges against each other. The 2 cases were consolidated, but PERC severed the 2 cases in order to issue 2 separate final orders. This issue's installment is about the lowlights of these recent cases.

One of PERC's Final Orders related to the City's charge that the IAFF unlawfully tried to circumvent PERC's exclusive authority with regard to impasse proceedings and the "financial urgency" statute; ss.447.403 and 447.4095, Florida Statutes, respectively.

The short strokes here are as follows. The City and the Union had a contract set to expire in its final year, September 30, 2011. In the year before the contract was going to expire the City experienced "a budget deficit," and declared "financial urgency" pursuant to s.447.4095, F.S. The "financial urgency" provision animates a fast-tracked and closed-ended period of "negotiations which shall not exceed 14 days;" after which the normal impasse provisions apply. As you all know well, the normal impasse procedures end with your employer's "legislative body." The arbitration-like dispute proceedings before the PERC (or mini-PERC) Special Magistrate result in his or her "Recommended Decision," which winds up with the dispute being resolved finally by your City Council, or City Commission, or County Commission. In other words: the putative "arbitrations" in Florida pertaining to unresolved collective bargaining negotiations' disputes/"impasses" are not "binding;" whereas disciplinary and/or contract interpretation arbitrations are final and "binding" (with notable extraordinary exceptions).

In any event, knowing the City intended to modify the contract in effect because of its declared "financial urgency," the Union filed a class grievance to stop the City, which went to contractual arbitration. The arbitrator ruled against the Union and denied the grievance. The Union then went to circuit court and tried by way of a declaratory action to get the term "financial urgency" declared unconstitutionally vague. The circuit court ruled against the union and denied the request for declaratory and injunctive relief (subsequently "affirmed" in the 3rd District Court of Appeal).

After the City declared its compressed "financial urgency" negotiations with the Union at impasse, the City Commission enacted a Resolution unilaterally modifying the firefighters' wages, health insurance, and the pension plan. And the City Commission did all of this *before* the impasse hearing. Sounds like an unfair labor practice, doesn't it? While we all know the impasse proceedings result only in a "Recommended Decision" a City Commission freely can ignore, wouldn't you think that at a minimum the law would require the "legislative body"/City Commission to wait until *after* the impasse proceedings; that the pretense of due process couldn't be ignored?

The statutory scheme applying to public employees' contract disputes is based upon a separation of powers theory more accurately identified as a legal fiction when it comes to public employment. As a branch of government traditionally separate from the chief executive and populated by elected representatives, city commissions are given final authority to resolve public employees' contract disputes on the theory they will act in their representational capacity; as elected representatives of their taxpayer/citizen consumers of the public employees' services, and representatives also of the employees (often residing within their jurisdictions). As the elected representative of those two constituencies, the city commission/"legislative body" is tasked by law to hold a hearing, to hear the competing interests of the chief executive and the public employees, and to "[t]hereafter . . . take such action as it deems to be in the public interest, including the interest of the public employees involved, to resolve all disputed impasse issues."

The laws applying to these public employment disputes are written as though the "legislative body" can function as an objective neutral after its receipt of the PERC special magistrate's findings and "recommendations." This notion is the reason for the statutory cone of silence that descends upon the "legislative body" immediately when one or the other side in the dispute (or both) formally "rejects" any special magistrate recommendation; an "insulated period" goes into effect during which neither the city manager nor the employees may discuss the dispute with any commissioner **until** the open public hearing is had.

If city commissioners were not composed of part-time "legislators" who hire (and fire) city managers to do their bidding, by whom they as a "body" are represented full-time, with whom they establish the objectives for employees' contracts in advance of bargaining, and to whom they give authority to bargain and secure those objectives, then a more compelling argument

might be made that city commissions can function as objective neutrals in resolving disputed impasse issues. If the city manager was not the "legislative body's" representative, in fact and by law in collective bargaining with city employees, then there might be some separation of powers; the "insulated period" as a prohibition against ex parte communications with the dispute's arbiter(s) would be consistent with the separation, and the notion such legislative bodies can act in their purely representational capacity ("in the public interest, including the interest of the public employees involved"). The laws applying to these public employee contract disputes are written as though the "legislative body" is not the actual employer.

Example 1: The end to another year of your employment is at hand. You go to your employer and ask her if she's given any thought to what your pay will be for the upcoming year. ["Demand bargaining"]. You propose a raise in your rate of pay; she says she'd prefer a one-time lump sum based on a small percentage she intends to give all employees. ["Negotiations"]. No agreement and no handshake. ["Impasse"]. You come back another day and plead your case for a raise; long service, loyalty, long hours, challenging work, good work and work ethic. [Impasse "proceedings"]. Your boss says you're going to get a one-time lump sum based on a small percentage she's going to give all employees. [All disputed impasse issues resolved].

With the <u>City of Miami</u> cases, PERC abandoned the legal fictions and dispelled the pretense of due process in public employees' impasse disputes relating to "financial urgency."

Drawing on the first sentence of s.447.4095, E.S., the PERC Hearing Officer assigned to the Union's unfair labor practice charge concluded that once the City declared "financial urgency" it didn't have to wait for the impasse hearing before gutting contractual wages, hours and/or any other terms and conditions of employment (including pension provisions). Because the statute governing "financial urgency" fast-tracks the parties to meet "as soon as possible to negotiate the *impact* of the financial urgency," and because "impact" bargaining is a legal term of art applying to bargaining over changes to things exclusively within "Management rights" to change: no harm, no foul in going ahead with the change(s) *before* anyone gets to say "good morning special magistrate!" (After all, literally, the employees' union still has the "right" to the "legislative body's" resolution of the changes' "*impacts*.")

Example 2: You've climbed up into the ring for a boxing match. The referee calls you and your opponent to the center of the ring to remind you of the rules and directs you to touch gloves before going back to your respective corners and await the bell. You extend your glove to make the touch; your opponent delivers a devastating one-two combination. The referee administers the ten count, raises your opponent's hand and everybody goes home. The promoter makes sure you get your percentage of the purse, but agrees to split with you the costs of the ambulance and your medical attention.

While Example 2 would violate the Marquess of Queensberry Rules established in 1867, your legislative body's decision to devastate your wages, hours and terms and conditions of employment *before* the "contest" doesn't violate the rules governing disputes arising from your employer's declaration of "fiscal urgency."

So, the Union lost its challenge to the City's changes to its contract *before* the impasse hearing; its unfair labor practice charge against the City was denied.

There remained, however, the City's unfair labor practice charge against the firefighters' union: for trying to stop the City's changes to its contract by filing a grievance, and for going to court twice; all of which efforts failed. The City's ULP alleged that the Union's efforts were an illegal attempt to circumvent PERC's exclusive jurisdiction and authority under the Chapter 447 proceedings animated by the City declaration of "financial urgency," and that the illegal evasions delayed the impasse's resolution. I'm running out of space here, so I'll spare you the analyses of the various claims. Suffice it to say the PERC hearing officer and the Commission agreed that the Union's efforts were legitimate, and that the City's ULP against the Union properly was denied. The Commission reversed the hearing officer's award of attorneys' fees and costs to the Union as a "prevailing party," however, based upon distinctions between a statutory "financial emergency," a provision in the parties' contract that defined "a true fiscal emergency" (a basis for the grievance), and the Chapter 447 provision's "financial urgency," among other things.

Along the way, central to the hearing officer's and the Commission's considerations, was whether the Union's purpose with its grievance and court actions was "to force the City to engage in unlawful binding interest arbitration." While I'm well-acquainted with the non-binding nature of special magistrate impasse proceedings since moving to Florida, I confess: In 25 years of labor and employment law practice I never had occasion to read a sentence alleging a party to a dispute had tried "to force the [other] to engage in unlawful binding arbitration." The words "unlawful binding arbitration" stuck in my head and triggered the thought process culminating in this installment; that the thing most frightening to public employers is the prospect of due process in the resolution of contract disputes with their employees. To part-time legislators, for whom such noble pubic service additionally may advance their day jobs and provide ready access to guns and badges, the thought of an independent neutral judging their avocational public employment practices is paralyzing.

PERC's decisions in these cases have transformed mandatory subjects of bargaining (e.g., wages, health insurance, and pensions) into matters subject only of "impact" bargaining whenever a public employer claims "financial urgency." While PERC wouldn't define "financial urgency," it found that "it is not necessarily a financial emergency or bankruptcy." Whatever a "financial urgency" may be, it's enough now for a public employer to go ahead and break a contract.

With no right to strike, and with binding arbitration also "unlawful," public employees' in Florida are hostage by design to legislative bodies; relying for wages and terms and conditions of their employment and their retirement upon politicians' relative considerations, "including the interest of the public employees." If only public employers' collection of union dues could be made "unlawful," in addition to unions' political uses of that money, those pesky public employees' contracts would never be a problem.

Two Documents For Success

It is my understanding that this report is made for administrative, internal police department purposes only. This report is made by me after being ordered to do so by lawful supervisory officers. I have not been permitted a reasonable amount of time to confer with a PBA representative or attorney. It is my understanding that by refusing to obey an order to write this immediately, that I can be disciplined for insubordination and that the punishment for insubordination can be up to, and including, termination of employment. This report is made only pursuant to such orders and the potential punishment/discipline that can result for failure to obey that order.



- ✓ to be represented by a PBA **attorney** during any interrogation;
- ✓ to be provided any complaint, all witness statements, and all existing evidence (e.g., audio and video recordings, GPS locator information) for review **with an attorney before** the beginning of any interrogation;
- ✓ to be interrogated at a reasonable hour (e.g., at a time when a PBA attorney can be present for the review and interrogation);



- ✓ to refuse a polygraph, and
- ✓ to refuse to respond to questions if an investigator intentionally fails to comply with requested requirements after being advised of his or her violations of those requirements.

As a dues-paying member, a Palm Beach County PBA attorney can be with you every step of the way.

Police officers can deal with PTSD-like symptoms after shooting

or 30 years, retired Miami-Dade police Sgt. Tony Monheim says, he had the same bad dream.

He is on the job. He is being assaulted.

Something is wrong with his gun.

"I couldn't pull the trigger or there was something wrong with the bullet; it just fell out of the end of the gun. And I was still being attacked.

"Well, I came to find out lots of cops have this same dream."

If buried dreams of assault are common among cops, so is the aftermath of a real shooting. True, only a tiny fraction of law enforcement officers will ever be in what is known as an officerinvolved shooting.

But local enforcement agencies in Palm Beach County aren't dealing with a single shooting. Four agencies are grappling with a stunning seven officer-involved killings in six months – four of them in a matter of weeks.

By comparison, just three people were killed by law enforcement officers in Palm Beach County in all of 2011.

And when an officer does fire his gun, the potential psychological backlash is predictable, troubling and can span months if not years: In the immediate aftermath police officers almost inevitably experience some symptoms similar to those of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. In fact, entire departments can be shaken by a single fatal shooting.

There's sentiment that police are facing increasing violence that can lead to such shootings. Figures compiled by the non-profit National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund in Washington D.C. report 70 officers nationwide died in gunfire in 2011, a 19 percent increase from 2010 and a roughly 70 percent increase since 2008. Of the seven fatal shootings in Palm Beach County since the first of the year, four involved an exchange of gunfire.

Gun pulled; senses sharpen

The psychological effects on cops start as soon as their gun is drawn. For more than 60 percent of officers involved in a shooting, time slows down, said Monheim, who has lectured nationally to law enforcement agencies on how to handle such shootings. For roughly 20 percent, time speeds up.

Officers frequently report tunnel vision. Their sight is focused on the perceived threat in front of them. As a result, they can later describe extreme detail in their narrowed vision.

In one study, a police officer recalled seeing what he thought were flying beer bottles. He was all the more puzzled because they had the word federal on them.

It turned out he was seeing the writing on shell casings falling to the floor from his partner's gun.

Officers' hearing is diminished as their bodies automatically focus on other senses key to survival. That's why so many involved in a shooting recall hearing gunfire as only "pops" or don't recall hearing orders to stop shooting.

Hearing, though, can actually sharpen if the officer is in a dark environment, and for the same reason: survival.

It's the body's classic response to fight or flight – with a caveat. "The officer can't retreat," said Monheim.

Officers with tears

The body's response may be universal, but in the minutes and hours after a shooting, "there is no one cookie cutter reaction," said Russell Fischer, a chief with Miami Dade Police for 33 years who along with Monheim teaches courses on officer-involved shootings.

"Sometime an officer will be dazed or inattentive. I have seen officers with tears in their eyes, already starting to question themselves."

Nightmares, fear for safety

If officers react differently at the scene, some later fallout is common to many, if not most.

Post traumatic stress symptoms are most commonly associated with soldiers who experience battle. But trauma comes in all shapes and sizes, and cops are not immune.

Even in the best cases, officers typically spend sleepless nights second-guessing their actions. "Normally, when they lay down at night, they would replay the incident over and over, only in so much more of a slow motion than actually happened," said Christine Cunningham. She is team leader of the nonprofit Critical Incident Stress Management Team of Palm Beach County, which offers support to officers and others in the wake of traumatic incidents.

"That's when those thoughts of coulda, shoulda, woulda emerge."

Further, "It's not just the officer," said Sgt. Ron Davis,the Boynton Beach Police Department's commander for the Critical Incident Stress Management Team. "It involves co-workers, it affects families and friends of those officers."

One National Institute of Justice research paper found a host of potential problems. In the first 24 hours after the shooting, for instance, almost half of those interviewed reported trouble sleeping and fatigue. In the first 90 days, roughly half reported persistent thoughts, while one out of 10 reported nightmares, and more than one in 10 reported anxiety, fear for safety and fear of legal problems.

Angry with loved ones

Other studies have found that the range of reactions can be broader, especially in the early days: post-shooting problems can include anger at friends and family, for instance, and in worst cases, suicidal thoughts.

Symptoms can persist: A full year after he shot a suspect in the arm, one out-of-state officer wrote, the event had, in spite of extensive support, "changed my life and the lives of my family."

That's not to say cops are necessarily debilitated by shootings. Three months after an incident, most symptoms abate, according to the National Institute of Justice research. Only about one in five still suffered severe reactions after that time, the authors found.

That may be attributed to departments frequently having some form of post-shooting counseling. "I think there has been a change in philosophy over time," said Davis.

"It used to be if you admitted you were bothered, it was this huge black mark and belief that you would be assigned to the rubber gun squad. That old-guard mentality is changing."

In West Palm Beach, for instance, an officer is cleared to go back to work only if a psychologist deems him or herfit for duty.

But counseling can be tricky. In at least one study, researchers found cops were apt to lie to psychologists, even as they unburdened themselves to other officers. There's a reason for that: Department-ordered therapy means therapists may report their conclusions back to administrators. Negative findings can keep a cop from getting back to work.

Boynton, Cunningham's group and certain other departments offer something additional: peer-to-peer counseling in the immediate wake of a shooting.

Under public microscope

Whatever the psychological fallout, it will be played out against the court of public opinion — and, more rarely, a real

court — as available details of the shooting are widely debated and formally scrutinized.

Usually, officers are placed on paid administrative leave immediately after a shooting. Two investigations can start: one by the department, to determine if any policies or procedures were violated and another by the state attorneys office to rule out criminal misconduct.

Investigations take a toll, said Fischer. "Until the prosecutors weigh in, it can weigh heavily on an officer's psyche with possible long-term consequences."

"By virtue of having risked their lives, they are now a de facto suspect in a felony crime," said Alexis Artwohl, an Arizona-based international consultant who teaches seminars on behavior science to law enforcement agencies.

Recent history suggests local cops have little to fear in the way of criminal prosecution. During former State Attorney Barry Krischer's 16-year tenure, only one police offer was criminally charged following a fatal shooting, he said.

Krischer, who does volunteer work for the Palm Beach County Sheriff's office, points out that his predecessor took every officer-involved shooting to a grand jury. He came to office with a different philosophy.

"I made the decision that part of the job was to have moxie to decide 'good shoot,' 'bad shoot' or grand jury. If it was a good shoot, I was not going to put an officer through the mental anguish of a grand jury investigation."

In fact, community support is a mitigating factor in whether a police officer will experience post-shooting symptoms, and if so, how severe they may be.

It helps, too, to know that they are not alone — or crazy. Says Cunningham, "What I always say is that the event is crazy, not the person going through it.

ATTENTION: RETIREES

Please take notice that pursuant to §95.11(3), Florida Statutes, lawsuits, including "an action founded on negligence," and "for assault, battery, false arrest, false imprisonment, or any other intentional tort..." must be filed "WITHIN FOUR YEARS" of the incident date.

To the extent that such lawsuits may be brought against you <u>after</u> you retire, you need to consider continuing your membership for four (4) years beyond your retirement.

If you are retired but have returned to law enforcement and are currently paying a "RETIREE MEMBER-SHIP," you should be aware that if you are subject to such actions at a time when you no longer are paying the appropriate dues, the PBA cannot provide legal assistance. See Palm Beach County Policy 12-1.

Enjoy the full peace of mind your retirement should mean.

REMINDER

The legal defense policies of the Florida and Palm Beach County PBA have an important provision regarding representation. If a member elects to secure representation by anyone other than the PBA (a private attorney, for example) that member is considered to have waived representation by the PBA. Once this happens, it is the PBA's option whether or not to continue to represent the member in that matter. Please call the PBA office if you have any questions regarding this policy.

817.311 UNLAWFUL USE OF BADGES, ETC.

(1) (817.311 SS)From and after May 9, 1949, any person who shall wear or display a badge, button, insignia or other emblem, or shall use the name of or claim to be a member of any benevolent, fraternal, social, humane, or charitable organization, which organization is entitled to the exclusive use of such name and such badge, button, insignia or emblem either in the identical form or in such near resemblance thereto as to be a colorable imitation thereof, unless such person is entitled so to do under the laws, rules and regulations of such organization, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in S. 775.082 or S. 775.083.

(2) This section shall be cumulative to any and all laws now in force in the state

Florida Statutes (1987).

PLEASE NOTE

843.085 Unlawful Use of police badges or other indicia of authority: (l) Unless appointed by the Governor pursuant to chapter 354, authorized by the appropriate agency, or displayed in a closed or mounted case as a collection or exhibit, to wear or display any authorized indicia of authority, including any badge, insignia, emblem, identification card, or uniform, or any colorable imitation thereof, of any federal, state, county, or municipal law enforcement agency, or other criminal justice agency as now or hereafter defined in S. 943.045, which could deceive a reasonable person into believing that such item is authorized by any of the agencies described above for use by the person displaying or wearing it, or which displays in any manner or combination the word or words "police," "patrolman," "agent," "sheriff," "deputy," "trooper," "highway patrol," "Wildlife Officer," "Marine Patrol Officer," "state attorney," "public defender," "marshal," "constable," or "bailiff," which could deceive a reasonable person into believing that such item is authorized by any of the agencies described above for use by the person displaying or wearing it.

(2) To own or operate a motor vehicle marked or identified in any manner or combination by the word or words "police," (etc.) Or by any lettering, marking, or insignia, or colorable imitation thereof, including but not limited to, stars, badges, or shields, officially used to identify the vehicle as a federal, state, county or municipal law enforcement vehicle or a vehicle used by a criminal justice agency as now or hereafter defined in s. 943.045, which could deceive a reasonable person into believing that such vehicle is authorized by any of the agencies described above for use by the person operating the motor vehicle, unless such vehicle is owned or operated by the appropriate agency and its use is authorized by such agency, or the local law enforcement agency authorizes the use of such vehicle or unless the person is appointed by the Governor pursuant to chapter 354

(3) To sell, transfer, or give away the authorized badge or colorable imitation thereof, including miniatures of any . . .

(4) NOTHING IN THIS SECTION SHALL PROHIBIT A FRATERNAL, BENEVOLENT, OR LABOR ORGANIZATION OR ASSOCIATION, OR THEIR CHAPTERS OR SUBSIDIARIES, FROM USING THE FOLLOWING WORDS, IN ANY MANNER OR IN ANY COMBINATION, IF THOSE WORDS APPEAR IN THE OFFICIAL NAME OF THE ORGANIZATIONS OR ASSOCIATIONS.
